Educator Teaching Tips

Helping Students Understand and Use Technology to Successfully Navigate K-ELPA

- 1. K-ELPA is assessed using KITE Client.
- 2. Students should become familiar with the process of logging into KITE.
- 3. Students should become familiar with the process of logging into KITE. Students have a username and password assigned specifically to them when they take the actual assessment; however, interactive demos use generic logins. These logins may be used again and do not expire. No results are stored for interactive demos.
- 4. K-ELPA tests four different domains: reading, writing, listening and speaking. For purposes of the interactive demo all four domains are included in one demo. When students take the actual assessment each domain is assessed separately. A Daily Access Code (DAC) for each domain assessment will be provided by the District or Building Test Coordinator to educators. Students enter the DAC to enter the test.
- 5. The only domains that may be tested using an iPad are: reading, writing and listening. Speaking items may only be tested on a desktop or laptop computer.
- 6. A <u>video</u> is available to familiarize educators with helpful teaching tips when using K-ELPA interactive demos.
